

# Call for Participants Space for Dialogue

Since October 7, 2023, public discourse in Germany has grown increasingly polarized, marked by mistrust and strong emotions. Antisemitism, anti-Muslim sentiment, and anti-immigrant attitudes are on the rise. Public debates and private discussions are often marked by pressure to take a clear stance, leaving little space for nuance, complexity, or quieter voices.

But controversial debates are essential for a pluralistic democratic society. We are creating a brave space for people with international backgrounds to come together and engage in open and respectful dialogue – without the pressure to position themselves in a particular way or the fear to be (miss)quoted afterwards. Therefore the discussions follow the Chatham House rules. Our goal is to make diverse perspectives visible and to foster deeper understanding through moderated conversations on complex and often contentious issues.

#### How does it work?

A core group of 8–10 participants with international backgrounds will meet in six closed sessions with experts from politics, academia, and civil society. After a short expert input, the group will engage in a moderated discussion. Each session lasts two hours (7:00–9:00 p.m.), with the opportunity for informal conversation afterwards.

- · Freedom of Speech
- · Belonging and Exclusion
- · Germany's Culture of Remembrance


